



Lenten Dismissal at Great Compline



On Monday through Thursday evenings, the priest recites a prayer on bended knee, while the faithful are likewise on their knees, or prostrate themselves, according to local custom. But onn Friday evening, the priest and people stand for the usual dismissal.

We then exchange the Small Rite of Forgiveness, which in parishes usually takes this or a similar form:

Priest: Bless me, brothers and sisters, and forgive me a sinner all wherein I have sinned this day in deed, word, and thought, and by all my senses.

People: May God forgive and have mercy on thee, holy father.
And prostrating, they say:
Pray for us, holy father, and forgive our sins.

Priest: May God, through His grace, forgive and have mercy on us all.

Concluding Litany

Priest: Let us pray for our Metropolitan N., for our Bishop [or Archbishop] N.,
and for all our brethren in Christ.

The choir responds, slowly, softly, and continuously:

1 Lord, — have mer - cy. 2 Lord, — have mer - cy.

before us, the Orthodox who here and in all the world lie asleep in the Lord:

When the choir stops singing, the priest concludes:

Let us also say for ourselves:
